WHAT'S COOKING





Jerusalem artichokes (left) are a native tuber that are best harvested in late fall or very early spring. They are high in carbs but do not spike blood sugar and can be used any way you use potatoes. We sliced some very thin and fried them in oil to create tasty golden brown chips.

WHAT'S VISITING THE FARM





Footprints from a bunny rabbit and a live garter snake were spied in the edible forest this month. Both can be beneficial: the bunny does some stimulative pruning and fertilizes; the snake eats bugs and slugs. But bunnies can become a nuisance when their population swells and they chew woody stems damaging or killing the plants.

HOW DO WE PROTECT THE PLANTS





Rodents of all stripes including bunnies can damage plants by chewing the bark off the lower stems. To protect the stems when the base is narrow, a hardware

solution of castor oil for additional deterrence.
