WHERE ARE SIGNS OF SPRING









Spring has arrived! Despite the current wintry weather, signs of the season are abundant in the Enchanted Edible Forest. Catkins on Hazelburt trees (pollinated by wind) are elongating and filling with pollen; crocuses are

small, slow-growing trees related to dogwoods which bear tasty, tart, edible cherries in August,

WHAT'S GROWING UNDER LIGHTS





Late last month Dani planted a flat of annual "rainbow" chard for the vegetable garden and a flat of perennials for the edible forest including (clockwise from upper left): garden sorrel, chives, chamomile and yarrow. The chard can tolerate temperatures down to about 20 degrees and will be transplanted into a garden row once the chance of nights going lower than that has passed. In time, the perennials will be transplanted into individual pots to mature before they are planted out to provide edible groundcover in the enchanted forest.

WHO'S VOLUNTEERING





The Home-Scale Forest Garden Show had its first shoot this month to document late winter activities in the Edible Forest.. Here WPBS's production team members Tracy Duflo and Eric Cleary capture Dani in her living room planting perennial herb seeds in a flat. Next, the team moved outdoors to shoot Dani pruning currants and raspberries, frost-seeding clover, planting dormant cuttings, and harvesting (and later cooking) sunchokes. The production team will return several times over this growing season to cover the ecological principles incorporated in the garden as well as seasonal tasks including harvesting perennial herbs, vegetables, berries, fruits and nuts. The eventual six-episode series should be ready for distribution in the Spring of 2025.
